Hamilton County High School is located in a rural section of north-central Florida, just south of the city of Jasper.

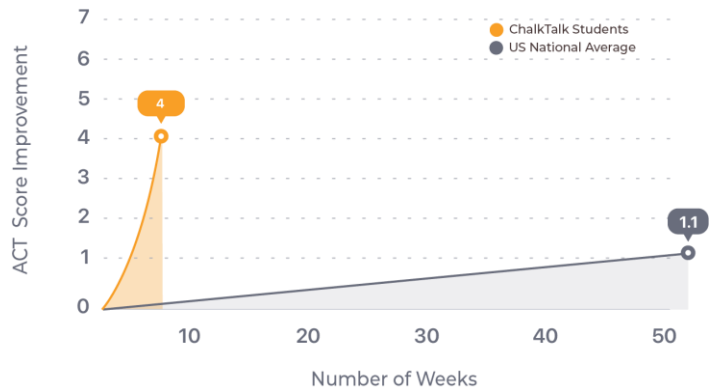
The school has an enrollment of 673 students, 62% of whom are classified as economically disadvantaged.

## Results reported by "Growth"



### 3.6x more improvement

than the national average ACT score improvement (1.1 points)

## Impact Study Methodology



### 17% less time

than the national average ACT score improvement period results achieved in 9 weeks vs 1 year.



Students start by completing an official ACT practice test. Based on the results of the practice test and the school's implementation schedule, ChalkTalk generates an adaptive blended learning curriculum for each class in the school schedule—whole group instruction materials, small group practice and instruction, and individual practice exercises are generated for each class. Upon completing the ChalkTalk program, students then take another official ACT practice test. This impact study reports on both "growth" and "proficiency" using the scores from these two official practice tests.

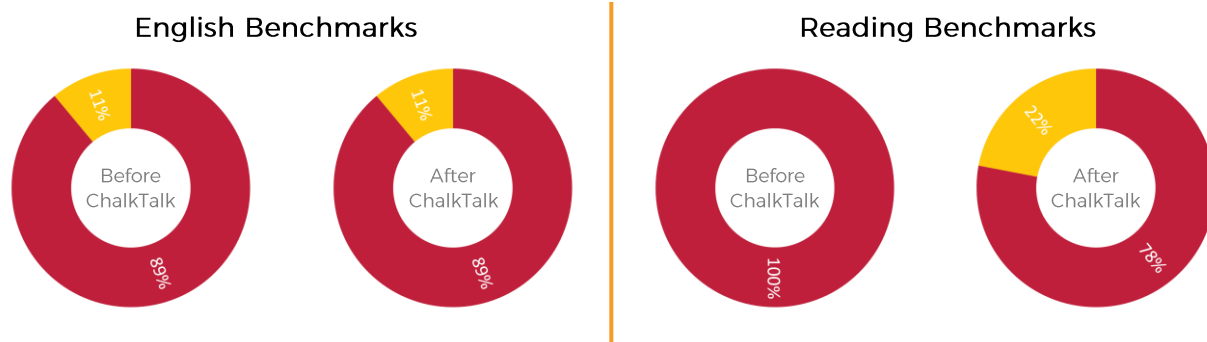
## Results reported by "Proficiency"

The ACT College and Career Readiness Benchmarks are a set of benchmark scores for each ACT test that determine if the student is meeting the current grade level and is college ready. The benchmarks are shown below:

Based on the College-Readiness benchmarks, the following color-coding was used to create the pie charts below"

- : Student is behind by 2 or more grade levels.
- : Student is behind by 1 grade level.
- : Student meeting the benchmark of the current grade level.

22% of Active students that participated in the ChalkTalk program improved by one or more grade levels.
